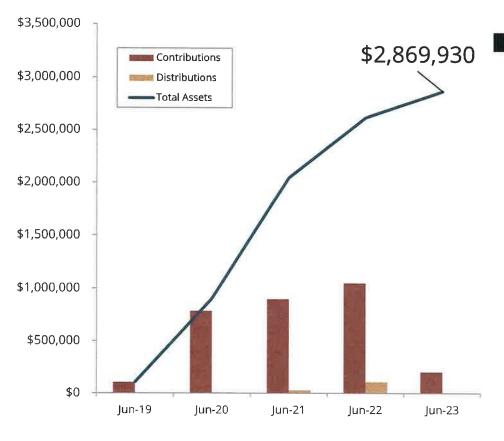

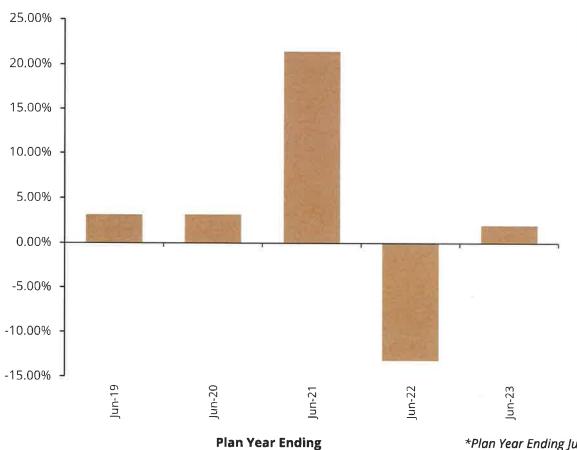

FIRES BY TYPE



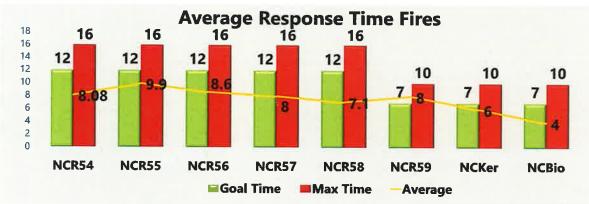

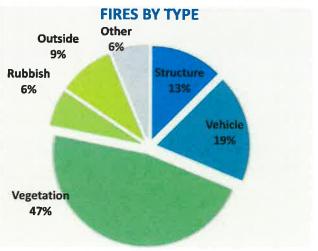
EMS/Rescue 194 **Call Types**
